

Phil Robinson Jailed for Sexual Crime against a 15 year old .. Now a meeting in his home in Saskatchewan.

Trigger Warning: Childhood sexual abuse, victim blaming

.
Philip/Phil Robinson is a member of the 2x2/Truth church in Saskatchewan. He is the current elder of a Wednesday night meeting.

In 1991, Phil served two years in prison for a serious sexual crime against a 15-year-old who was under his care. The child had been removed from another professing home by social services and placed with the Robinsons, allegedly at the request of the workers. . While Phil served his short sentence, church members were asked to attend meetings at the jail, to ensure that Phil could be included. Shortly after his release, he was made an elder. Several years ago, his Union Sunday elder status was removed due to an alleged affair, and he now has a Wednesday meeting in his home.

Jim Atcheson (current overseer of SK) and Larry Greenaway have been addressed about this in recent months, but have not shown any interest in changing the situation.

Through discussions with people who were connected to the area at the time of the conviction, I've learned that some were told by workers that he was jailed for a "breach of trust", while others were told it was business-related charges, tax fraud, or a false allegation. Many blamed the survivor for being promiscuous, and many people who have known Phil and met with him throughout the last few decades were completely unaware of it at all.

In 1991-1992, the workers in Saskatoon were Jack Price and Morris Grovum. I do not have lists for 1990-1991 or most of the rest of the 90s. If you have those years, I would love to add them to my files.
